ABOUT THIS SERVICE

Good Shepherd Sunday

In the Episcopal Church, the fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally known as Good Shepherd Sunday. All three annual scriptural cycles—the selection of biblical readings appointed by the Book of Common Prayer and the Revised Common Lectionary—feature excerpts from the tenth chapter of John as the Gospel reading. This passage is saturated with imagery describing Jesus as "the good shepherd"; other service elements such as Psalm 23 ("The Lord is my shepherd"), hymns and anthems, and the Collect of the Day reinforce that depiction. The word "pastoral," as it pertains to giving spiritual direction, is actually derived from the Latin word for "shepherd."



The Word of God

The First Reading

Acts 9:36–43

Reader A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.





If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.
