#### The Season after Pentecost

Our current liturgical season, the Season after Pentecost, is by far the longest of the Episcopal church year. It begins the day after Pentecost and ends the day before the First Sunday of Advent. Since the date of Easter changes every year—and the Day of Pentecost is always 50 days after Easter—the length of the season varies as well, ranging from 24–29 weeks in length. This season is sometimes called Ordinary Time, a phrase borrowed from the Roman Catholic Church.

# The Word of God

## The First Reading

Isaiah 1:1, 10-17

Reader

A Reading from the Book of Isaiah.

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, which he saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem in the days of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah.

Hear the word of the LORD, you rulers of Sodom! Listen to the teaching of our God, you people of Gomorrah! ## The Second Reading

*Reader* A Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.





If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.





#### ABOUT THE MUSIC

Belgian composer Joseph Jongen was a talented organist and pedagogue who imprinted his signature style onto the organ and organ/orchestral repertoire. A child prodigy, Joseph Jongen enrolled at the conservatory in Liège, Belgium at 7 years of age; a student of Sylvain Dupuis, Jean Théodore Radoux, and Charles Marie Danneels. Jongen won multiple prizes in composition before 1897, the same year he won the coveted Grand Prix de Rome. Jongen's musical style resonates in American churches and concert halls, as he has a very relatable harmonic language and a sense of melody that often sounds similar to George Gershwin or Leo Sowerby. His "Prière" from the *Quatre Pièces* is a meditative and melodic work that bears a resemblance to the American folk song "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen."

Johann Sebastian Bach's Prelude and Fugue in D Major, BWV 532 embodies the style of organ playing characteristic to Bach's early Weimar period. As *Konzertmeister* at the ducal court of Weimar (1708–1717), he employed his knowledge of North German and Italian forms to create lengthier and more complex compositions, developing the genre of Prelude and Fugue to its structural limits. Described as a "battle horse for the modern organist," the D Major is often performed on instruments far removed from Bach by time and location (even the pedal piano by some 19th-century French performers). However, an informed recreation of the work must take into account the diverse influences on Bach and his organs during his early career.

The D Major Prelude and Fugue was composed circa 1710. Similar to other works of this genre, the two movements were not intended to be performed together. Bach had not yet implemented the two-section compositional formula; early sources seem to suggest that the fugue (BWV 532b) was written sometime before the multi-sectional prelude. Nonetheless, manuscripts as early as 1730 have the prelude and fugue presented as one work. An early example is found in a Pachelbel manuscript (1740) and bears the title "Preludio Concerto." At the end of the manuscript, Pachelbel notes "in this fugue one must let the feet really kick about."


