The Season of Creation

Christians around the world often set aside a "season within" the Season after Pentecost as a time to place God's good creation at the center of our shared spiritual intentions. This devotional focus was suggested some thirty years ago by Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios I, and has since been embraced by the Anglican Communion and the World Council of Churches.

ABOUT THE MUSIC

For Celebration Sunday, we hear Charles Hubert Hastings Parry's well-known choral masterpiece "I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me." Drawn from the verses of Psalm 122, Parry originally wrote the anthem to accompany the crowning of Edward VII. Nine years later, he revised it for the coronation of George V, which is the version most known today and subsequently used at various state occasions.

To launch our season and celebrate the completion of our pipe organ, organist Anna Lapwood will offer a much-anticipated opening concert this afternoon. A global ambassador for organ and champion for women in music, Ms. Lapwood is also a conductor, composer, and educator. The Trinity Youth Chorus has learned her new arrangement of "Make You Feel My Love" (originally by Bob Dylan and arranged by Anna for the Pembroke College Choir), featuring the voices of our young musicians as well as the power of our new instrument.

English composer Michael Tippett is best known for the oratorio *A Child Of Our Time*, written from 1939–1941 as a musical response to the events of WWII. He incorporated well-known spirituals into his work, connecting the struggles and experiences of different communities across cultural boundaries. "Steal Away" is set for an eight-part chorus with soprano and tenor soloists.



Our 10-year project culminates in a season of genre-defying performances featuring Anna Lapwood, Avi Stein, Alcée Chriss III, and more.
