ABOUT THIS SERVICE

The Season after Pentecost

Our current liturgical season, the Season after Pentecost, is by far the longest of the Episcopal church year. It begins the day after Pentecost and ends the day before the First Sunday of Advent. Since the date of Easter changes every year—and the Day of Pentecost is always 50 days after Easter—the length of the season varies as well, ranging from 24–29 weeks in length. This season is sometimes called Ordinary Time, a phrase borrowed from the Roman Catholic Church.

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;
if we endure, we will also reign with him;
if we deny him, he will also deny us;
if we are faithless, he remains faithful—
for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.







ABOUT THE MUSIC

Carson Cooman is an American composer with a diverse output of hundreds of works ranging from solo instrumental and orchestral works to hymn tunes and operas. “Psalm 66” is an anthem for choir and organ that makes use of mixed meter (5/8 and 7/8 time) to infuse the music with a sense of dance.

Stacey V. Gibbs is a prolific composer, arranger, and clinician who specializes in arrangements of spirituals. His version of the beloved “Wade in the Water” achieves contrast between angst and calm by utilizing active 16th-note rhythms for the words “God’s a gonna trouble” while using longer, smoother note values for the word “wade.”

“The Eyes of All Wait Upon Thee” was composed by German-born American pianist, composer, and music educator Jean Berger. Born Arthur Schloßberg in Germany in 1909, he moved to Paris in 1933 where he took the name Jean Berger. In 1941 he emigrated to the United States where he became a U.S. citizen and lived until his death in 2002.
