

Christ's Ministry of Healing

Healing people's sickness, wounds, hurts, and brokenness was a principal feature of Jesus' ministry, and Christians have always sought the ministry of the living Christ for our healing, including relying on those to whom God has given gifts in the medical professions. But prayer is a part of the healing process too, and offering your prayers to God in your search for healing is certainly appropriate.

We believe that Jesus' offering of himself for the salvation of the world was and is his great act of healing, and the power of that act is extended to us every time we celebrate the Holy Eucharist and receive Communion. Herein is Christ's primary ministry of healing to us: given day in and day out to his people.

After receiving Communion, those who wish may come to the Chapel of All Saints for laying on of hands and anointing with holy oil (unction) by the clergy.



The Word of God

The First Reading

Genesis 32:22-31

Reader A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

Jacob got up at night and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

ABOUT THE MUSIC

British composer Janet Wheeler wrote her "Beati quorum via" as an homage to the setting by Charles Villiers Stanford. Taken from Psalm 119, the Latin text expresses the first two verses—"Blessed are those who are blameless, who walk in the law of the Lord"—alternating between upper and lower voices throughout the motet.

Sir John Rutter, who just celebrated his 80th birthday last month, has composed a wealth of choral works, and is particularly well known for his Christmas carols and anthems, along with his larger choral orchestral works: *Gloria*, *Requiem*, and *Mass of the Children*.

"Bring Us, O Lord God" was composed by Sir William Henry Harris in 1959. Like his other well-known Anglican mainstay, "Faire is the Heaven," this motet is written for double choir. The text by John Donne paints a resplendent picture of heaven and is often read as a funeral prayer.
