ABOUT THIS SERVICE

The Nativity of Our Lord: Christmas Eve

The celebration of Christ's coming among us at Christmas—the Incarnation—is one of the two highest holy days of the Christian year, along with the celebration of his resurrection on Easter. In the Book of Common Prayer, Christmas Day is one of the seven principal feasts. The Christmas season lasts twelve days: from Christmas Day until January 5, the day before the Epiphany.

Christmas is much more than simply the celebration of Jesus' birth: it reminds us of the central truth that “the Word became flesh and lived among us” (John 1:14), fulfilling the prophecy that “the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Emmanuel—God is with us” (Isaiah 7:14, Matthew 1:23).

The Holy Gospel

Luke 2:1–20

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Deacon In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, “Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.” And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

“Glory to God in the highest heaven,

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, “Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.” So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ABOUT THE MUSIC

Adapted from Elinor Wylie's "Velvet Shoes," Lucy Walker's anthem "We Shall Walk" brings to mind the serene, almost otherworldly experience of walking alone through freshly fallen snow. Its musical setting mirrors the imagery, featuring a soaring soprano line and a fluid, expressive melody.

Benjamin Britten's "A Hymn to the Virgin," an anthem for mixed voices, has remained a favorite among choirs for almost a century. A graceful melody paired with a mysterious refrain sung by a semi-chorus creates striking dramatic and emotional contrasts. It is extraordinary that such a masterful work was composed when Britten was only sixteen—and during a period of illness.

Composed in 1919, "A Spotless Rose" stands among Howells' most treasured *Three Carol-Anthems*, alongside the equally lyrical "Here Is the Little Door" and "Sing Lullaby." Drawn from a 15th-century anonymous poem, its text tenderly portrays the story of Christ's birth and the immaculate purity of Mary.

Franco Prinsloo, an acclaimed composer from Pretoria, South Africa, is celebrated for his vocal and choral works and serves as Artistic Director of the Vox Chamber Choir. For "On That Holy Night," Prinsloo crafted both the music and text, creating a poignant introduction that sets the stage for the story about to unfold in the evening services.

John Rutter's "Christmas Lullaby," composed to honor the 70th birthday of Sir David Willcocks, pairs Rutter's own text with the timeless "Ave Maria" refrain, resulting in a work of profound beauty.

Michael Gareppy's "O Holy Night," arranged for eight-part choir, offers a stunning new interpretation of the beloved carol, capturing its essence in a vibrant and majestic setting.

Throughout all our services, we join together in singing beloved hymns—enhanced by soaring descants and accompanied by strings and our magnificent new organ. We warmly invite you to lift your voice in song and praise as we celebrate this most holy night.
