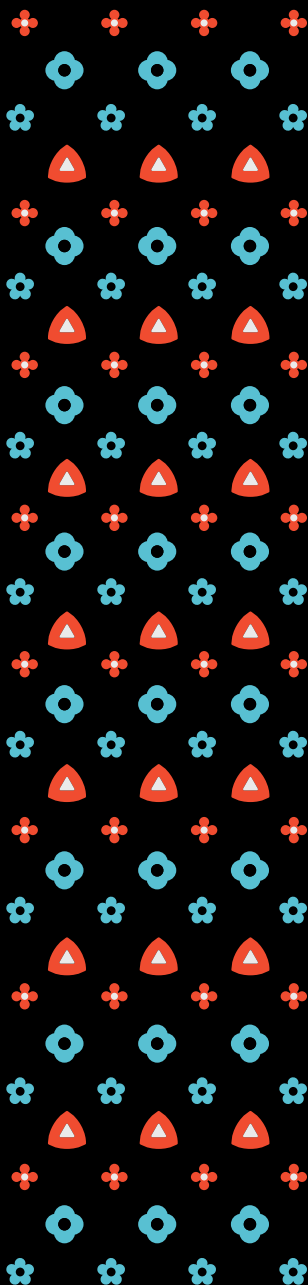

ABOUT THIS SERVICE

Epiphanytide

The season of Epiphany bridges the liturgical seasons of Christmastide (a festive season) and Lent (a penitential season). As with the Season after Pentecost, also known as Ordinary Time, the number of Sundays in Epiphanytide is variable—from five to nine weeks—since the date of Easter changes each year.

The Word of God

The First Reading

Isaiah 58:1–9a

Reader

A Reading from the Book of Isaiah.

Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgments, they delight to draw near to God. “Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?” Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the LORD?

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer; You shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

Reader A Reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

“What no eye has seen, nor ear heard,
nor the human heart conceived,
what God has prepared for those who love him” —

these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.

Moses and the people of Israel were led from bondage in Egypt through the Red Sea into the wilderness and eventually to the promised land. 



ABOUT THE MUSIC

Usually performed by solo voice and piano, this arrangement of “You Can Tell the World” by Margaret Bonds reimagines the beloved spiritual for *a capella* treble voices. In this arrangement, Bonds creates a driving and percussive texture in the upper and lower parts that punctuate and accentuate the familiar melody line. Born in Chicago in 1913, Margaret Bonds had an expansive career as a pianist, composer, educator, and performer. A pioneer in her field, Bonds was the first African American woman to perform with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and only the second African American woman in classical music to be elected to full membership in the American Society of Composers and Publishers (ASCAP). Her most prominent works include her spiritual arrangements and her frequent collaborations with writer and activist Langston Hughes.

Based on Matthew 5:14–16, “This Little Light of Mine” gained broad popularity in the United States in the 1920s. Though its origin is contested, the most widely accepted version is attributed to evangelist Harry Dixon Loes. Loes’ arrangement has since become a staple in hymnals across denominations and was one of many spirituals and folk songs used by marchers and organizers during the Civil Rights Movement. Today the choir sings an arrangement by Moses Hogan. Born into a musical family in Louisiana in 1957, Moses Hogan is regarded as one of the most celebrated American choral conductors and arrangers. Hogan trained as a pianist, conductor, and composer at Oberlin Conservatory, Louisiana State University, and Juilliard. The founder of the Moses Hogan Chorale and the Moses Hogan Singers, Hogan published over 80 original arrangements of well known spirituals during his lifetime. Hogan’s rich, layered pieces are some of the most beloved and enduring pieces in American choral repertoire.
