

ABOUT THIS SERVICE

Transfiguration Sunday

While the feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord is celebrated annually in The Episcopal Church on the fixed date of August 6, the last Sunday after the Epiphany is often informally called "Transfiguration Sunday."

In all three years of the lectionary cycle, the appointed Gospel reading for this final Sunday of Epiphanytide recounts an incident—described by three of the four gospel writers—in which Jesus appears to his disciples Peter, James, and John in dazzling, otherworldly glory on a mountaintop. Christ's dramatic revelation as the Son of God is a fitting culmination to the scriptural arc of the Epiphany season, which focuses on the many ways in which Jesus manifested his divinity while in human form.

The Word of God

The First Reading

Exodus 24:12–18

Reader A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses, “Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction.” So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. To the elders he had said, “Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them.”

Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the LORD settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. Now the appearance of the glory of the LORD was like a devouring fire on the top of the mountain in the sight of the people of Israel. Moses entered the cloud, and went up on the mountain. Moses was on the mountain for forty days and forty nights.

Reader A Reading from the Second Letter of Peter.

We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, “This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.” We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.

So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Deacon Six days after Peter had acknowledged Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the living God, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him. Then Peter said to Jesus, “Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.” While he was still speaking, suddenly a bright cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud a voice said, “This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!” When the disciples heard this, they fell to the ground and were overcome by fear. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, “Get up and do not be afraid.” And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone.

As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, “Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead.”

ABOUT THE MUSIC

This Sunday's selections are based on themes of light. The Latin hymn *O nata lux* (O Light born of Light) is powerfully set by the young British composer Lucy Walker, as well as by young Haitian composer Christopher Ducasse. Both settings make use of the full range of the choir, with striking five- and six-note chords in close harmony. Both anthems bear a heavy influence from late Romantic keyboard and vocal writing.

Dr. Alcee Chriss's postlude improvisation will explore the popular folk hymn "Jesus, the Light of the World," whose refrain states: "We'll walk in the light, beautiful light; come where the dew-drops of mercy are bright. Shine all around us by day and by night, Jesus, the light of the world."

To Be the Church in This Moment

In an increasingly fraught time, we might find ourselves wrestling for control — over our own lives and over the actions of others. But God is uncontrollable, and as the Bible shows us time and again, divine love will sweep through our world regardless of the limits and powers of our day. Today, Hanna Reichel, Charles Hodge Professor of Systematic Theology at Princeton Theological Seminary, leads a discussion on their “emergency devotional,” *For Such a Time as This*, and highlights what Christians can do to respond faithfully to challenging moments.
