## Good Shepherd Sunday

In the Episcopal Church, the fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally known as Good Shepherd Sunday. All three annual scriptural cycles—the selection of biblical readings appointed by the Book of Common Prayer and the Revised Common Lectionary—feature excerpts from the tenth chapter of John as the Gospel reading. This passage is saturated with imagery describing Jesus as “the good shepherd”; other service elements such as Psalm 23 (“The Lord is my shepherd”), the anthems, Hymn 343 (“Shepherd of Souls, Refresh and Bless”), and the Collect of the Day reinforce that depiction. The word “pastoral,” as it pertains to giving spiritual direction, is actually derived from the Latin word for “shepherd.”

For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.

“He committed no sin,

When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

## The Holy Gospel

John 10:1-10

*Deacon* The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

*People* **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

*Deacon* Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."





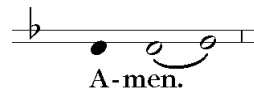

#### ABOUT THE MUSIC

Herbert Howells's *Requiem* was composed in 1932 but remained unpublished for nearly fifty years, finally appearing in 1981. Scored for unaccompanied choir with soloists, the work weaves together texts from the traditional Requiem Mass with other sacred sources, creating a deeply personal and contemplative whole. Today's offertory features the setting of Psalm 23.

Becky McGlade sets William Blake's text "The Lamb," well known in the choral repertoire through John Tavener's celebrated setting, which also served as an inspiration for McGlade's work. Reflecting on the text, the composer writes: "The biblical symbol of the lamb represents one of the most profound theological mysteries. That divine omnipotence is revealed through the image of the lamb speaks volumes about the humility and self-sacrificing nature of God."

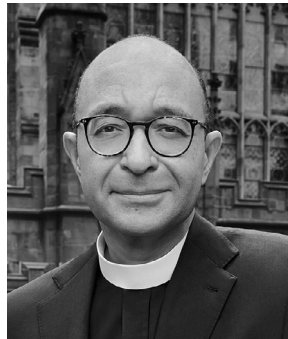

#### Silvano Monasterios Venezuelan Nonet

Born and raised in Caracas, Venezuela, jazz pianist Silvano Monasterios has captivated audiences worldwide with awe-inspiring technique, soulful improvisation, and his innate compositional gift. Join us as Monasterios and his ensemble perform his suite, *The River*, inspired by tragic events in Venezuela in 2017, when peaceful demonstrators were attacked by the country's authoritarian regime.
