ABOUT THIS SERVICE

The Day of Pentecost

Pentecost, celebrated fifty days after Easter Sunday, is one of the principal feasts of The Episcopal Church, and is commonly regarded as the birthday of the broader Christian Church. On this day, as described in the reading from Acts appointed for the Day of Pentecost, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit—the third person of the Trinity—to his disciples, as he had foretold in his teaching. As is common with many feast days pertaining to Jesus' apostles, it is customary to wear red vestments to symbolize the “tongues, as of fire” that inspired them to preach the Gospel in other languages.

Pentecost is also one of the four holy days (along with the Great Vigil of Easter, the Baptism of Our Lord, and All Saints' Day) especially suitable for Holy Baptism, as well as for confirmation and reception: sacramental rites which can only be performed by a bishop. Today we welcome the Rt. Rev. Matthew F. Heyd, Bishop of New York, to preach and preside as these new and renewing Christians join Trinity Church.

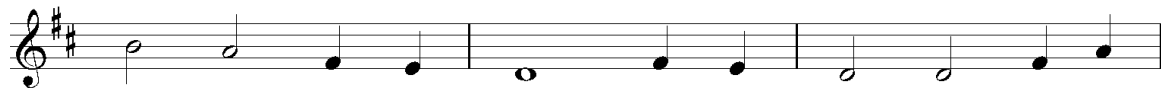

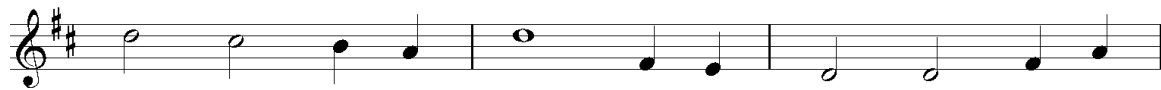

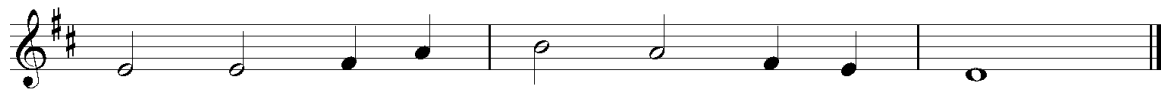

The First Reading

Acts 2:1–4

When the day of Pentecost had come, the apostles were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Celebrant We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Baptism

Each Candidate comes to the font with their Sponsor and is presented by name to the congregation.

The Deacon says the following for each Candidate:

Deacon The name of this candidate is *N*.
Will you all please name this candidate?

The People repeat the Candidate's name.

The Rector pours water upon the Candidate.

ABOUT THE MUSIC

The music for this Sunday juxtaposes the Trinity Choir with renowned jazz musicians from the New York area. With a focus on the spirit- and fire-filled themes of Pentecost, today's selections were picked specifically to demonstrate the many musical tongues through which we offer praise and thanksgiving to God.

Jazz selections by composers Duke Ellington ("Come Sunday") and Dizzy Gillespie ("Con Alma") hearken to themes of prayer and soul. The well-known hymns "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" and "Every Time I Feel the Spirit" have been arranged by our own Dr. Alcee Chriss III to give them imagination and new life.

The powerful anthems sung by the choir represent both spectrums of jazz and spiritual music, both the European tradition and the African-American spiritual tradition, as highlighted by composers Rollo Dilworth and Will Todd. Dilworth serves as Professor of Music at Temple University, and has over 200 choral compositions which have been received to great acclaim. His composition "Jeremiah's Fire" is filled with unbridled rhythmic energy that mirrors the "burning desire" Jeremiah felt to preach God's word. Will Todd's "Come Down and Hold Me" makes use of rich harmony and ambient orchestration to create a sound that enhances this simple prayer that pleads for "angels above" to come down and point one's soul to heaven.
