ABOUT THIS SERVICE

Ascension Day is one of the seven Principal Feasts of the Episcopal Church. Celebrated on the 40th day after Easter (and therefore always on a Thursday), it commemorates the day when Jesus ascended into heaven in the sight of his disciples, as described by today's lectionary readings (Acts 1:9, Luke 24:51). It was his final appearance on earth. Each time we say the Nicene Creed (BCP p. 358) or the Apostles' Creed (BCP p. 96, 120), Christians affirm our belief that Jesus both rose from the dead and is now exalted in glory.

This holy day is particularly important in the history of Trinity Church Wall Street: on Ascension Day in 1846, the current Trinity Church building, designed by architect Richard Upjohn, was consecrated. We mark its 172nd anniversary by including leaders of the vestry and congregational council in the procession beginning the service.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST READING

Acts 1:1-11

Reader A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

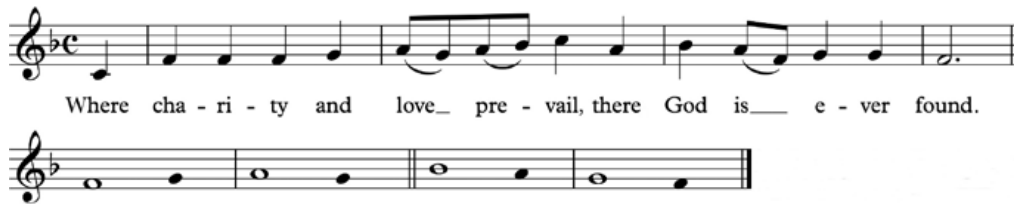

Also, you may dip the bread in the wine and then consume it, or you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice-bearer to dip in the wine and place on your tongue. Gluten-free wafers are available. Those who do not wish to receive communion are welcome to receive a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Trinity Church Rejuvenation Update and Worship Schedule

Over the past several months, the church design team has developed the scope for a rejuvenation of the Trinity Church interior by testing lighting, cleaning techniques, stained glass hues, and paint colors, including the colors originally envisioned by Trinity's architect, Richard Upjohn, in the 1840s. The tests have generated a number of discoveries that you can learn more about at trinitywallstreet.org.

The design phase is now complete and plans are in place to begin a sustained period of work inside Trinity Church starting May 7.

To allow the work to proceed as efficiently as possible, beginning Monday, May 7, our weekly service schedule will be as follows:

Weekdays (beginning May 7): Morning Prayer (8:15 and 9am) and the 12:05pm weekday service will be offered Monday-Friday in the Chapel of All Saints in Trinity Church. Evening Prayer (5:15pm, Monday-Wednesday and Friday) and Evensong (5:15pm, Thursday) will continue in the Chapel of All Saints in Trinity Church.

Sundays (beginning May 13): The 8am, 9:15am, 11:15am, and Compline services will be held in St. Paul's Chapel. Nursery will be available in the Chapel of Remembrance in St. Paul's Chapel. The 9am service will be held in the Chapel of All Saints in Trinity Church.

This schedule is expected to be in place until the work is substantially complete, in the spring of 2020 or possibly sooner. During this time, the nave of Trinity Church will be closed; the Chapel of All Saints will be open to the community for services, events, and prayer. The entrance to the Chapel of All Saints is accessible through the north churchyard.

In addition to weekly service changes, the following location changes are planned:

Beginning May 6, all Brown Bag Lunch packing and distribution will move to St. Paul's Chapel. The schedule of packing and distribution will not change.

Beginning May 7

- Trinity's Chapel of All Saints will be open daily 7am-6pm for prayer unless a service or event is being held in the space.
- St. Paul's Chapel will be open daily from 10am-6pm, except for Wednesday, when the chapel will open at 11am to accommodate the Preschool chapel.
- A Sister of St. Margaret will be available in the Chapel of All Saints 10:30-11:45am weekdays for anyone who needs to talk, pray, or just sit quietly with someone.
- Congregational Council meetings will take place in the Chapel of All Saints.
- Catch Your Breath will be held in the Chapel of All Saints.
- Trinity's Gift Shop will close but the online shop still will be available.

Beginning May 11, regular weekly tours of St. Paul's Chapel will be available at 3pm on Fridays.

More details will be forthcoming from the Rector, the Vicar, and the Communications & Marketing team in the days to come, and throughout the duration of the rejuvenation project.

Security Enhancements

To accommodate the May 7 closing of Trinity Church's nave, the following security arrangements will be in place at Trinity Church and St. Paul's Chapel.

At Trinity Church, worshippers for weekday services and the 9am Sunday service will enter through the exterior door to the Chapel of All Saints on the north side of the church. Everyone will be asked to undergo a bag check and wand.

At St. Paul's Chapel on weekdays and Sundays, magnetometers (metal detectors) will be in use at the south Broadway door and the Church Street doors for visitors, staff and parishioners. The south Broadway door is an entrance, the north Broadway door is an exit, and the Church Street doors act as both entrance and exit.

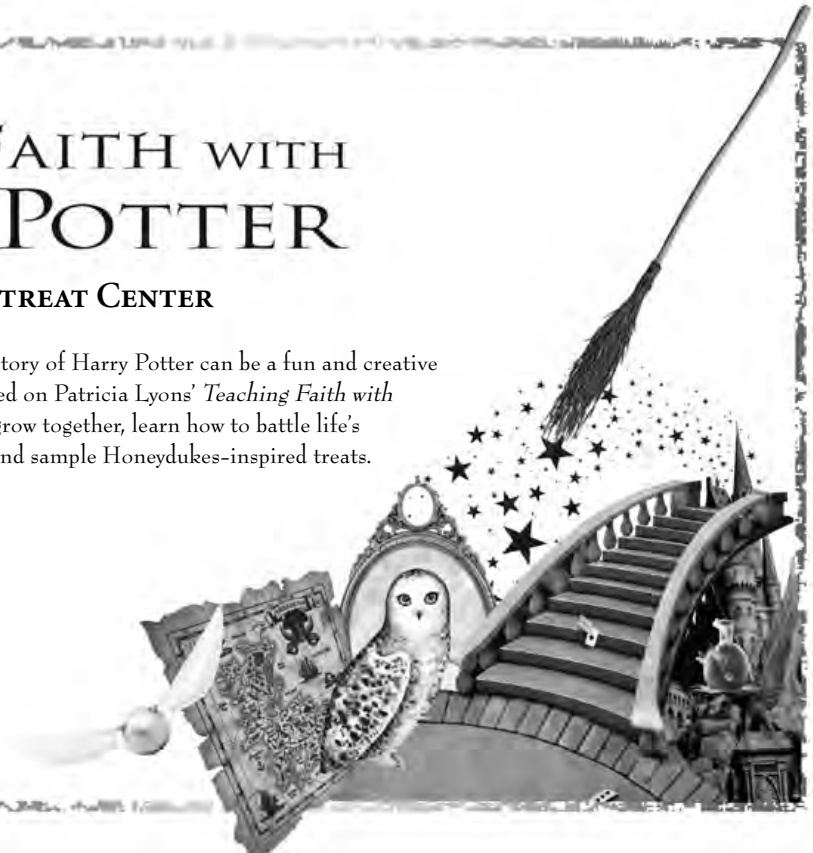

The image on the bulletin cover is the Trinity Seal. Inspired by The Revelation to John 10:1–10, it represents the arrival of the first Anglican Church in the colony of New York in 1697. The seal features a “mighty angel” with a “face like the sun, and his legs like pillars of fire,” straddling the sea and the land and transferring the Gospel, brought from England by the ship, to a child, a symbol of the young colony of New York. In the scroll below the angel’s feet appear the words “JURO TEMPUS NON FORE AMPLIUS” which translate as “I Swear That There Shall Be No More Delay,” referring to the urgency of establishing the Church. Bulletin cover poetry is from the Revised Common Lectionary project sponsored by the Jean and Alexander Heard Library and the Vanderbilt Divinity Library, a division of the Heard Library.

This is a service of Holy Eucharist according to Rite II, which begins on page 355 of the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP). Scripture readings are appointed by the *Revised Common Lectionary* and are excerpted from the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible. Psalm texts are taken from the St. Helena Psalter. Hymns come from *The Hymnal 1982*, *Lift Every Voice and Sing* (LEVAS), and *Wonder, Love, and Praise* (WLP). Other service elements may also come from additional sources as noted, including *Enriching Our Worship* (EOW), and *All Desires Known* (ADK) by Janet Morley.
