

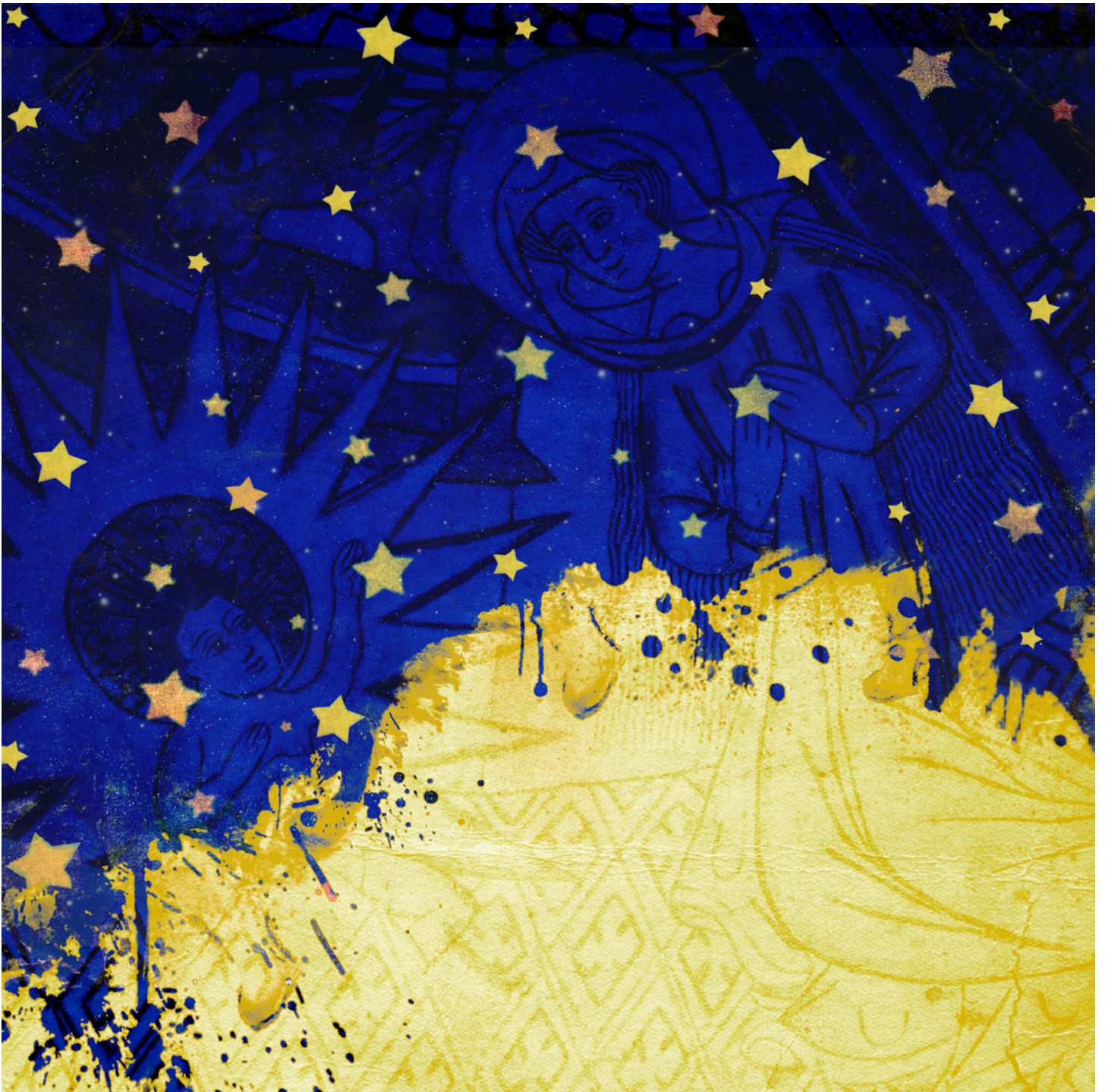

About this Service

Christmas Eve

The celebration of Christ's coming among us at Christmas—the incarnation—is one of the two highest holy days of the Christian year, along with the celebration of his resurrection on Easter. In the Book of Common Prayer, Christmas Day is one of the seven principal feasts. The Christmas season lasts twelve days: from Christmas Day until January 5, the day before the Epiphany.

Christmas is much more than simply the celebration of Jesus' birth: it reminds us of the central truth of “the Word became flesh and lived among us” (*John 1:14*), fulfilling the prophecy that “the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel—God is with us” (*Isaiah 7:14*).

The Nativity story we tell today is written by Episcopal priest and theologian Jerome Berryman, using the beautiful and evocative language of Godly Play, the Montessori-based program of Christian formation. The Nativity puppets were designed and built by Lavinia Roberts and Cecilia Roberts. They premiered at Trinity Church in 2016.

You may choose to dip the bread in the wine and then eat it, or you may leave the bread in your palm for the chalice-bearer to dip it in the wine and place on your tongue. You may receive both the bread and the wine, or only the bread or only the wine, as you choose.

Gluten-free wafers are available; please let the minister know that you need one.

If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.
