About this Service Trinity Sunday

Today is Trinity Sunday, the third Principal Feast of the Episcopal Church to occur during the past six weeks. On Trinity Sunday, the Collect and Preface—prayers specific to the day—invite us to contemplate the threefold nature of God: manifested as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and yet one unified Being. Trinity Sunday is always observed on the first Sunday after the Day of Pentecost; it was on this feast day in 1162 that great English martyr Thomas à Becket was consecrated Archbishop of Canterbury. Historically, from the 12th until the early 20th century, the Sundays after Pentecost were counted as the Sundays after Trinity.



The First Reading

A Reading from the Book of Proverbs.






