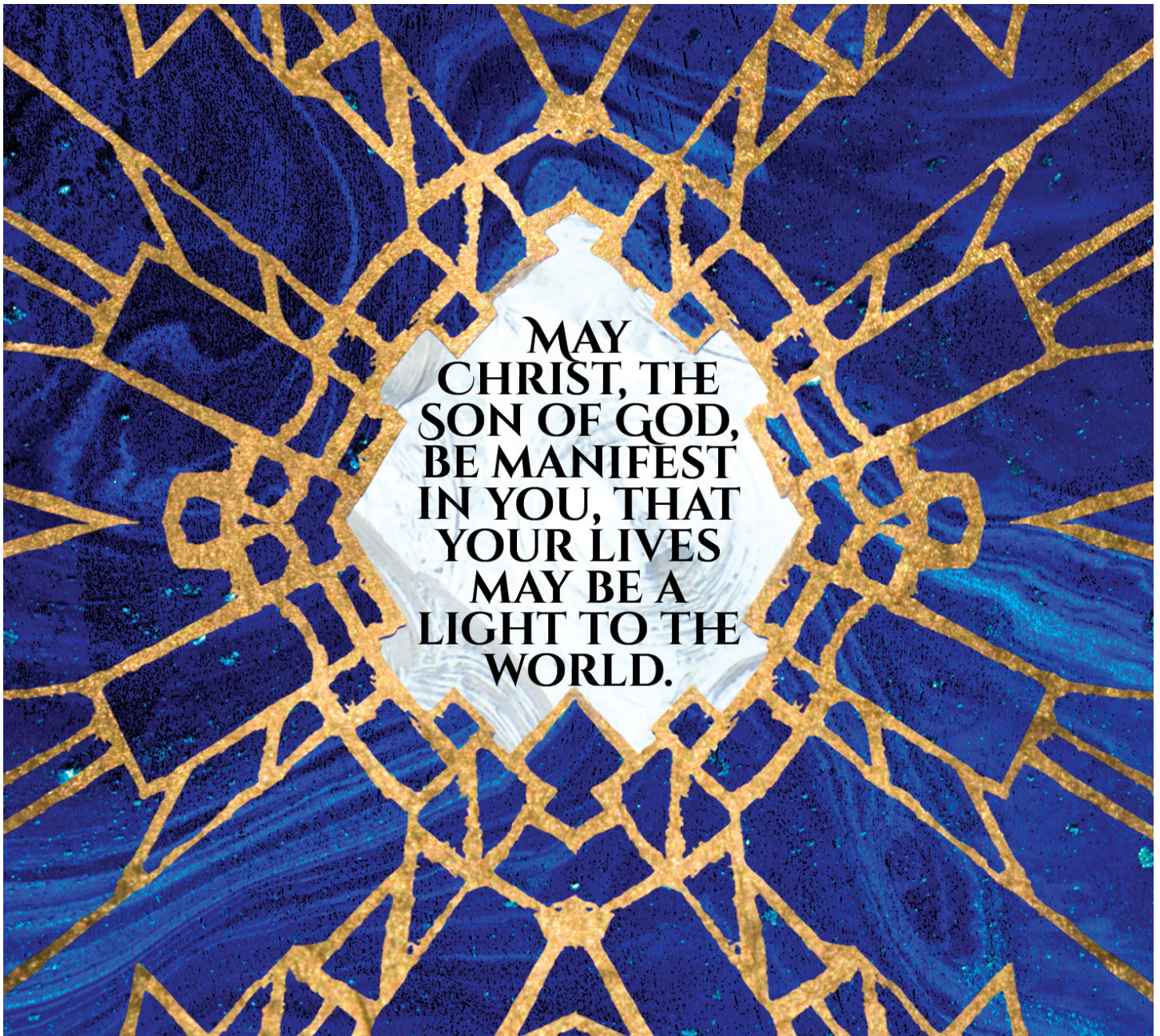

About this Service

Transfiguration Sunday

While the feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord is celebrated annually in The Episcopal Church on the fixed date of August 6, the last Sunday after the Epiphany is often informally called “Transfiguration Sunday.”

In all three years of the lectionary cycle, the appointed Gospel reading for this final Sunday of Epiphanytide recounts an incident—described by three of the four gospel writers—in which Jesus appears to his disciples Peter, James, and John in dazzling, otherworldly glory on a mountaintop. Christ’s dramatic revelation as the Son of God is a fitting culmination to the scriptural arc of the Epiphany season, which focuses on the many ways in which Jesus manifested his divinity while in human form.

Traditionally, “alleluia, alleluia” is added to the dismissal, since that word will not appear again in services until the Great Vigil of Easter.

The Word of God

The First Reading

2 Kings 2:1–12

Reader

A Reading from the Second Book of Kings.

When the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, “Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel.” But Elisha said, “As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.” So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, “Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?” And he said, “Yes, I know; keep silent.”

Elijah said to him, “Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho.” But he said, “As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.” So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, “Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?” And he answered, “Yes, I know; be silent.”

Then Elijah said to him, “Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan.” But he said, “As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you.” So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, “Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you.” Elisha said, “Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit.” He responded, “You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not.” As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, “Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!” But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

The Holy Gospel

Mark 9:2-9

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Celebrant From the beginning of time, the Lord our God has led people on pilgrimages to holy places. The patriarchs—Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob—and matriarchs—Sarah, Rebekah, Leah, and Rachel—each traveled at the Lord’s behest. Moses and the people of Israel were led from bondage in Egypt through the Red Sea into the wilderness and eventually to the promised land. Much later, the Magi were led by the Star of Bethlehem to the birthplace of our Lord, and Jesus, himself, as a boy traveled with the Blessed Virgin Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to the holy city of Jerusalem.

Now it is your turn. You are being called to a pilgrimage. A pilgrimage is a sacred expedition, a holy trip, where the interior journey is more important than the exterior one. Do you give yourselves to this pilgrimage?

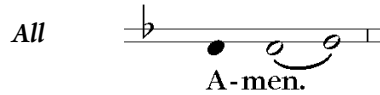
Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

Clergy will distribute communion from stations in front of the altar. If you need communion brought to you, please let an usher or sacristan know.

It is our custom to receive the bread in the upturned palms of our hands, and eat it immediately. Gluten-free wafers are available; please let the minister know that you need one.

Those who wish to receive wine should partake by sipping directly from the chalice (intincting, or dipping one's wafer into the wine, is no longer permitted). Please use your hands to gently assist the server in guiding the chalice to your lips.

If you do not wish to receive communion you are invited to come forward to receive a blessing, indicating your desire by crossing your arms over your chest.

The Environmental Justice Ministry Group is a faith-based group that examines, increases awareness, and acts around the most pressing problems of climate change and environmental justice. 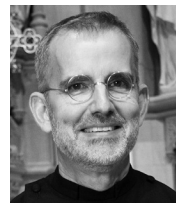
