

About this Service

Tenebrae

The name Tenebrae (the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows") has for centuries been applied to the ancient monastic night and early morning services (Matins and Lauds) of the last three days of Holy Week, which in medieval times came to be celebrated on the preceding evenings.

As we meditate on Christ's journey to the cross in poem, anthem, song, and story, one by one the candles and other lights in the church will be extinguished until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. Toward the end of the service this candle is hidden, suggesting the apparent victory of the forces of evil. At the very end, a loud noise is made (symbolizing the earthquake at the time of the Resurrection—*Matthew* 28:2), the hidden candle is restored to its place, and by its light all depart in silence.

The First Reading

Reader

From *The Love that is God* by Frederick Christian Bauerschmidt.

Rather than ask why God wants Jesus to *die* the way he did, we should ask why God wants Jesus to *live* the way he did and why this way of life led us to want to *kill* him. God wants Jesus to live the reality of God's kingdom, to live the kindness that is at the core of the divine identity while also living as one of us, facing all of the trials and troubles human flesh must face. God wants Jesus to live this way so he can show us what life in the kingdom of God—truly human life—is all about. And not simply to show us but also to forge a path into that kingdom, to give us a way to be what God created us to be. God wants Jesus to live this way even though God knows that such a life will get him killed....God desires that divine love be incarnate in Jesus, even knowing that this will be too much love for a grasping, frustrated, frightened world to bear. God desires that love be incarnate, even if that love must be crucified.

The second candle is extinguished. A brief silence is kept.

And then it sinks back into itself again, and to look at it no one would know it had anything to do with fire, or light....Wherever you turn your eyes the world can shine like transfiguration. You don't have to bring a thing to it except a little willingness to see. Only, who could have the courage to see it?....Theologians talk about a prevenient grace that precedes grace itself and allows us to accept it. I think there must also be a prevenient courage that allows us to be brave—that is, to acknowledge that there is more beauty than our eyes can bear, that precious things have been put into our hands and to do nothing to honor them is to do great harm.

To walk through these doors—even if it's only in curiosity, even if you sit in the back pew and pick apart every word the minister says, even if you have been coming into churches so long it's nothing but habit—to find yourself sitting in this place in the twenty-first century is to admit an insufficiency, an incompletion, at the center of your being. The church has remedies for this insufficiency, but it is by no means a permanent cure. That feeling of incompletion, that existential anxiety, that "tooth that nibbles at the soul," as that most faithful of atheists Emily Dickinson called it—I think if we are honest with ourselves we have to admit that this never quite goes away. You go to church and say your prayers and still something tugs at you all the time, will not let you rest in time, seems always to cast your mind forward with worry or backward with regret, to want something—to demand something—from you. Or maybe you drift away from church, away from prayer, and lose yourself in work or love, and maybe you're genuinely happy, you like your job, you're in a good relationship, and still sometimes it's as if you slide out of yourself and are watching yourself enjoying your life, or the words of a poem or song trigger some old restlessness you thought you'd left behind. That tooth nibbling at your soul.

This restlessness, this void that you can never quite fill, this tooth that will not stop nibbling at your soul—I would suggest today that this is the call of God. It is very private, a matter between you and God. It may come occasionally or it may seem part of the very air you breathe; it may come as frazzling anxiety or it may come as a still, small voice; but its warrant of authenticity is that it will not leave you alone, will not stop asking you: Who *are* you, really?

Things were different after that. God still loved the human creatures best of all, but the attraction was not mutual. Birds were crazy about God, especially ruby-throated hummingbirds. Dolphins and raccoons could not get enough of him, but human beings had other things on their minds. They were busy learning how to make things, grow things, buy things, sell things, and the more they learned to do for themselves, the less they depended on God. When the time comes to you at which you will be forced at last to utter the speech which has lain at the center of your soul for years, which you have, all that time, idiot-like, been saying over and over, you'll not talk about joy of words. I saw well why the gods do not speak to us openly, nor let us answer. Till that word can be dug out of us, why should they hear the babble that we think we mean? How can they meet us face to face till we have faces?



Electronic Voting | This year, eligible voters will have the option to vote electronically via an online platform. Instructions to vote were distributed to eligible voters on March 17, 2024, via email. Your email address must be on file in order to vote electronically.

Voting by Mail | A mail ballot form, accompanying biographical information, along with a pre-paid envelope, was mailed to all eligible parishioners on or before March 18, 2024. Registration can also be completed in person on Tuesday, April 2, 2024, upon application to the Rector, and upon proving the above-mentioned qualifications. Mail ballots must be received at 76 Trinity Place before 8pm on April 2.

Voting in Person | In-person voting will be held on Tuesday, April 2, 2024, from 4–8pm at Trinity Church (Broadway at Wall Street). The results will be announced on Trinity's website the next morning and at the Sunday services following the election.

Note that you may only vote once, via one of the methods outlined above. If a vote is registered via more than one method, only the first attempt will be counted.
