

Gluten-free wafers are available. Those who do not wish to receive communion are welcome to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

Time's Arrow begins

January 1-12, 2017

A Celebration of Music and the Arts in the New World for the 250th Anniversary of St. Paul's Chapel. Trinity's annual festival of January concerts, Time's Arrow, exemplifies Trinity's signature juxtaposition of early and modern music.
